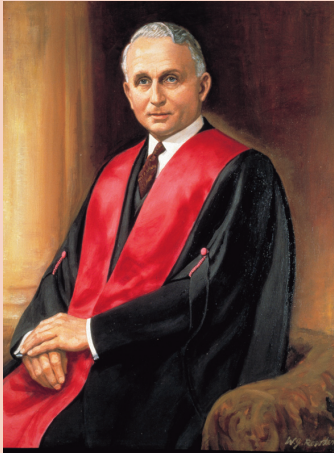

BASO Raven Travelling Fellowship 2020

BASO Raven Travelling Fellowship was endowed in 1993 by the Ronald Raven Trustees in memory of Ronald Raven, Founder of the Association.

The award is currently for a maximum of £3,000 and may be awarded to one or several individuals as considered appropriate by the BASO~ACS National Committee when considering the merits of their applications.

The scholarship is open to UK-resident trainees or recently appointed consultants, who have gained the fellowship of one of the British or Irish Colleges, and who intend to travel outside the UK. Applicants need not be members of BASO~ACS or BASO Trainees Group (although this is desirable) but applications must relate to the aims and objectives of the Association.

BASO~ACS (NIHR) Project Grant 2020

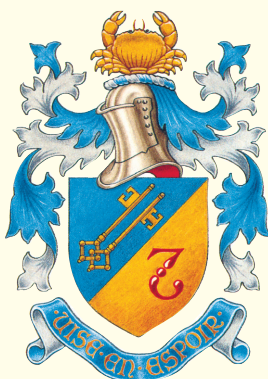
Applications are now invited for the BASO~ the Association for Cancer Surgery project grant, awarded to assist surgeons to undertake research projects related to surgical or surgically linked cancer care.

BASO ~ ACS is an NIHR non-commercial Partner. Research studies funded through our 'Project Grant' award scheme are eligible for consideration for NIHR Clinical Research Network support and inclusion in the Central Portfolio Management System (CPMS). The NIHR Clinical Research Network supports researchers and the life sciences industry in developing, setting up and delivering high quality research to time and target in the NHS in England.

Applications are sought for discrete projects such as projects seeking funding for the initial development of clinical trials, studies aimed at initial data collection to inform the design of a future trial or systematic reviews. Subject to satisfactory applications, one to three awards up to the total value of £6,000 will be made. Normally the award will be for one academic year.

BASO is delighted to offer a **BASO Trainees Prize** for the best surgical oncology presentation by a trainee at the Annual Conference of each Surgical Specialty Associations. To support surgical research and educational development each year, we offer the **Ronald Raven Travelling Fellowship** a bequest from Ronald Raven, one of the founders of the Association.

This year, BASO has announced the following awards:

- **BASO Trainees Audit/QIP Prize:** Open to trainees to encourage and support them in the audit /QIP projects with a view to improving care to patients .
- **BASO Multidisciplinary Prize:** Open to Non-Medical Professionals that are involved in the care / provision of cancer patients. Its open to any research, audit, quality improvement project.

EUROPEAN JOURNAL OF SURGICAL ONCOLOGY

Our in-house Journal, 'The European Journal of Surgical Oncology (EJSO),' aims to educate and inform about the many subspecialty disciplines of cancer surgery. The EJSO publishes original scientific articles, reviews, clinical trials, news and views, and other relevant materials; and has the worldwide readership. The Journal continues to go from strength to strength, and provide a valuable income for BASO .

The current impact factor is at 3.379, and the Journal was accessed over 460,000 times in 2018. Last year, over 1300 manuscripts were submitted for consideration of publication and the EJSO is on course to beat it this year. This is the highest number ever received in a year. As in previous years, the majority of submissions were original research articles, but there was an increasing number of review articles, short reports, and editorials. The average turnaround time for manuscripts is less than seven weeks, making it a very attractive Journal for members to submit their papers.

SILVER SCALPEL AWARD 2019 PRESENTED TO BASO TRUSTEE

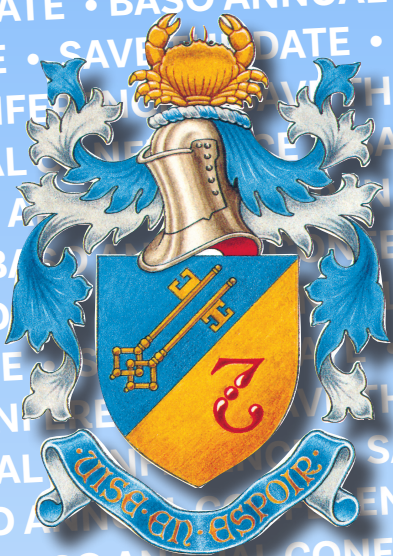


Mr Edmund Leung, BASO-ACS Trustee, is awarded the 2019 Silver Scalpel Prize. There were so many positive descriptions by his colleagues and trainees. His trainees described him as a selfless trainer who is willing to dedicate time to all trainees, health professionals and fulfil his numerous clinical roles, as well as being a father and husband.

Mr Leung sits on the National Advisory Committee for Surgical Oncology. He is leading the educational objectives of the committee in arranging MRCS/FRCS and cadaveric courses for all level of trainees. His knowledge and experience are evident in the Colorectal MDT discussions, where his decisions and/or arguments are evidence-based and always encompass a holistic patient approach. His colleagues value his opinion on challenging cases.

Mr Leung is a recognised laparoscopic trainer. Under his stewardship, staff grade surgeons at the Hereford County Hospital have benefitted from intense laparoscopic colorectal surgery and endoscopy training. Mr Leung’s

time commitment and dedication to junior colleagues is far superior than that demonstrated by his colleagues. He has also supported the personal development of the surgical department’s first and only Physician’s Associate, such that the Physician’s Associate has been inspired to apply to medical school in the pursuit of a surgical career! Mr Leung’s dedication to training also extends to theatre staff and ward nurses. Mr Leung was described as an “approachable, down-to-earth individual who is admired by his medical and allied health professional colleagues”. We look forward to Mr Leung using his skills in the delivery of the BASO educational activities.

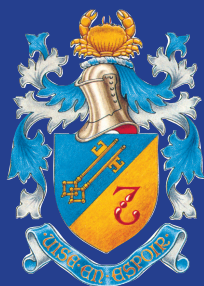
